RWInc is continuing as normal building confidence in red words, sounds and reading the focus stories. Those taking part in Sentence Stacking have built the beginning part of their stories and our character is just setting off on their adventure- we wonder what exciting events will happen along the way... In handwriting, we have moved on from the arm to boat join and have been working on our arm to sun joins.

In small groups, we have created food chains in science and talked about the carnivores, omnivores and herbivores in our chains. We know how important plants are for us to survive as the producers at the start of the chain!

Another busy week of learning in Magpies!

In English, we've been diving into explanation texts, and have started writing an explanation together named The Street Beneath our Feet. We've enjoyed reading the classic story of "A Bear Called Paddington," following the adventures of the lovable bear. Our focus in maths has been on finding the perimeter of different shapes, measuring and calculating the total distance around them.

During our history lessons we've explored the impact of the Roman invasion on British life today, discovering how ancient history still influences us. In science, we've been learning about seed dispersal and even made our own paper sycamore spinners to see how seeds travel.

We've been recreating abstract art inspired by Martin Bush and Clotaire Lehoux, experimenting with colours and shapes. In Spanish, we've practiced saying what fruits we like and don't like, expanding our vocabulary.

This week in our Barn Owl class, we've embarked on an exciting new Writing unit where students are creatively writing postcards from fairytale characters in prison. Imagine the Big Bad Wolf penning a note from his cell! In Maths, we've been exploring the concepts of area, length, and perimeter, with students measuring various objects and spaces around the classroom. It's been a hands-on experience that has really brought these mathematical concepts to life.

In PE, we've been having a blast with dance routines inspired by the 2000s and honing our tennis skills. The energy in the class is contagious! Our Art lessons have been equally inspiring, as students planned their own pieces in the distinctive style of Pablo Picasso. Finally, in Whole Class Reading, we've delved into a fascinating non-chronological report on Saturn, uncovering the mysteries of this magnificent planet. It's been a week full of creativity, movement, and discovery!



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
